St. Dominic Savio students took a four-day pilgrimage for March for Life to Washington, D.C. in January. After arriving Wednesday evening the students' pilgrimage began Thursday morning with a special trip to the White House. Thanks to a Savio parent and our local congressman for setting up this great opportunity. The self-guided tour of the East Wing of the White House allowed students to learn about the history of the different rooms and their various uses. Included in the tour were the East Room, Blue Room, Green Room, and the State Dining Room. Iron Eagles continue as strong competitors at TAPPS

The robotics season began in September when this year's challenge was first announced. Since then the teams have been meeting most weekdays from 4:00 p.m. until 6:30 p.m. with a few late night meetings to get ready for a competition.

The teams were part of the X-Treme League hosted by KIPP Collegiate in Austin. The league events consisted of three regular league meets ending with a league championship. From the league championship, 6272 Iron Eagles Prime advanced directly to the Area Championship as part of the winning alliance. 3708 Iron Eagles Optimus advanced to the Semi-Area event from which they advanced to the Area Championship. 8814 Iron Eagles Bumblebee advanced to Semi-Area, but was not able to advance to the Area Championship.

At the Area Championship, both 3708 and 6272 formed good alliances with other teams and were able to advance to the State Championship in March. Unfortunately, the teams did not have the same luck with good alliances at the state event, and therefore, did not advance to the World Championship.

Competition will continue with both teams competing at the TAPPS Robotics State Championship on April 6 in Waco.

The teams are eternally grateful to their mentors. Mike Butler helped establish the team in 2008 and continues to support them. He is now retired from National Instruments. Mike Gregoriois also a founding mentor that has continued to support our teams. Mr. Gregoriois works at Flex Manufacturing. The team programming guru is Scott Barnes (Señor Scott). He is employed by Oracle and has not only helped the teams with programming, but also manufactures custom parts in this home shop. Savio is very lucky to have these dedicated industry mentors.

International students thrive at Savio

Most of us cannot imagine leaving our family and friends to attend high school in a different country, but for Elli Hoa, Ella Xiao, Jim Lu, and Joy Yan that is only the first step in deciding to attend St. Dominic Savio Catholic High School in Austin, Texas when you live in China.

"It was an easy decision for me to come here because my sister was educated in the U.S. before me," said Elli Hoa, a Savio senior, who committed to New York University (NYU) following graduation this spring. "There's a better education and less pressure here."

Hoa arrived in the United States for seventh grade from Harbin, China, which is the capital of Heilongjiang, the northernmost province of China. She currently sees her parents every six months when they rotate to visit.

When Ella Xiao, an only child, arrived at St. Dominic Savio as a sophomore, she didn't know anyone. At home in Guangzhou, the southernmost region of China, her mother's friend worked with the founder and CEO of Premier Education Partners (PREP), Mr. Ed Wu, which is how she found out about the study abroad program.

"It was a culture shock for me, but I studied at an international school back home and was planning to attend college in the United States anyway," said Ella Xiao, who wants to attend NYU but is undecided about her major. "In the U.S. my English has improved and I learned a lot of slang."

The students say that China is strict about what is said on social media and criticizing the government in any way is forbidden, so they appreciate the freedom to "speak up" in the United States.

With advancements in technology, international students use WeChat to communicate with family, as in the case of Jim Lu, who has an 11-year-old brother along with his parents in Wuxi, a city near Shanghai in Eastern China.

Lui has been coming to the United States for education since eighth grade.

"I've been in the same host family for years," said Jim Lu, a Savio junior, who also shares the host home with Ella, Elli, and Joy. "It's nice because there is always someone around."

Lu says he wants to stay in Austin for college and plans to attend the University of Texas with an eye toward physical therapy.

The host family is Mr. Donald Su, who has been working with students from China for years.

"We enjoy being a host family," said Donald Su. "To see them transition from being reliant to self-sufficient, fearful about the future to full of confidence and expectation is truly a joy."

When sophomore Joy Yan was looking for a school in the United States, he used Google to find St. Dominic Savio from an Island off the coast of South Korea called Jeju, a United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) World Heritage Site.

"I had many American friends on the Island, so my English was very good," said Joy Yan, who arrived at Savio last year. Joy became involved in cross country, soccer, and track, and plays guitar and chess in his free time.

The next time you run into Elli, Ella, Jim, or Joy, be sure to include them in your activities as they rely on their friends as their family here in the U.S.

Teacher of the Year Congratulations to Mrs. Alanna Heyl, Christian Outreach teacher

n 2001, when Mrs. Alanna Heyl graduated as part of the first class of Cedar Park High School, there was no way she could have foreseen what God would have in store for her life.

In hindsight, one might see there was a plan for Mrs. Heyl to become not just a teacher, but a theology teacher, followed by the theology department chair, as well as a wife, mother of four children, and eventually the 2024 Catholic High School Teacher of the Year, as selected by the Texas Catholic Conference of Bishops (TCCB).

After meeting the man who would be her future husband, Danny, through a mutual friend at St. Thomas More, the pair would continue to date longdistance while she completed her undergraduate degree in Theology at Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas.

"I knew absolutely no one when I decided to go to school there, but I knew it was the college for me the minute I stepped onto campus," said Mrs. Heyl.

After obtaining a Master's in Theology at the University of Dallas, Mrs. Heyl went to work for St. Elizabeth of Hungary Catholic Church in Pflugerville as the Director of Religious Education and then stayed home for a few years when her oldest two children were very little. During this time she volunteered with a group to help bring TEC (Together Encounter Christ) Retreats to the Diocese of Austin. It was through this retreat program that she heard about a job opening at St. Dominic Savio Catholic High School nearly 12 years ago.

"Father Daniel Liu, the fulltime chaplain and Theology teacher at Savio, shared that he was being reassigned by the Diocese to another location and there was going to be an opening at the school, which he thought might be a good fit for me," said Mrs. Heyl, who had never taught in a formal environment.

Once in the role, Mrs. Heyl was a natural fit in the classroom and it was also a chance to develop the faith life for a very young school. "It was a once-ina-lifetime opportunity to build





new programs and ministries to further the culture and Catholic identity of the school," since it was only the fourth year the school was open. Over the years she had a part in developing Imago Christi Day as a service event, the Senior Retreat, the Timothy Team, Christian Outreach, the House System, and the Senior Project.

As the teacher of Christian Outreach at St. Dominic Savio, Mrs. Heyl helps her students to learn about Catholic social teaching and plan Imago Christi Day from the ground up each year. In Theology IV, she leads the students through learning about World Religions and Catholic Spirituality and Prayer, which includes the ideas of vocation, hearing God's call in their lives, and how they can serve others with their unique gifts and talents.

"I love all of the students, but the seniors, in particular, are making some big life decisions," she said. "I like being able to help them figure out what the future might look like for them and what role their faith will play in that."

There are many leadership opportunities at Savio, she adds, and by their senior year you can really see the students mature to where they work wonderfully together as a team, use each of their strengths, take initiative, and problem-solve along the way.

Perhaps we can all come to believe that God is truly guiding our lives with wisdom and purpose, leading us on the right path.

CAN they build it? CANstruction competition contributes to cause

As part of the curriculum for 3D modeling, students are asked to conceptualize and model design solutions using the Design Process developed by the University of Texas. Canstruction offers our 3D modeling students a unique opportunity to apply these principles while simultaneously contributing to a noble cause.



Whether it was brainstorming structural ideas or creating 3D models, "canstruction" proved to be quite a challenge. Each student was tasked with creating a presentation that included marketing slogans, sketches, models, constraints, deadlines,

and judging guidelines. This presentation also had to include a detailed spreadsheet of the total cost of the project along with the potential points each House could acquire. All in all, our 3D modeling students were able to pitch designs that led to a contribution of over 2,393 canned goods valued at \$3,045 in food donations to the St. Louis Food Pantry. A project that helps us develop the very servant leaders that we at Savio aspire to deliver.
