

This story begins back in August 2016, when a retired priest from Arizona reached out to Savio to see if there would be any interest in receiving a Relic of St. Dominic Savio. The priest contacted the Director of Campus Ministry, Chris Ochoa, and said he had a Relic with documentation from Rome approving the Relic of St. Dominic Savio as authentic.

"I would like to entrust it [the Relic] to an institution where it will be respected. After seeing the presentation of your school on the internet, I called your school's office and was told you would accept it, and so I'm sending it to you. May St. Dominic Savio bless your work and your high school."

After requesting permission to display the Relic of St. Dominic Savio, permission was granted from Bishop Joe Vásquez to display a few months later. When summer arrived, Mr. Jonithan Pendergrass, the Facilities Director, started working on the display case. He built and designed the display case to be installed in the school chapel. On June 23 the display case was finished and installed to hold a relic of St. Dominic Savio. Mr. Pendergrass built the display case out of wood with a thick protective glass that allows viewing and provides a permanent memorial that now resides in the school chapel. The case is a beautiful example of his custom carpentry and design abilities.

Students, faculty and staff are welcome to visit the chapel and pray in front of the relic during regular school hours. The relic is a reminder to the community

that St. Dominic Savio was a real person and it is possible to pray with our school intercessor. If you would like to visit the relic and are not a Savio student or parent, please contact the front office for visiting hours and additional visiting information.

We make these letters with scrutiny's of its faith and we bear witness, for the greater glory of God and the veneration of His Saints, to have recognized the particle from the bones of St. Dominic Savio conf., furnished from authentic body parts, which exhibited in a silver case, gilded of a round shape, well closed, protected with crystal, tied by a slender silken rope of a red color, and signed with our sigil imprinted above the wax dyed with vermillion, we have collected reverently: with power made for the sake of retaining it among yourselves and for the sake of display for the public veneration of Christians. We warn however the faithful or the following in whose hands these sacred relics will come, in no way to allow them to sell it, nor to exchange with these things, in order to make the kind of merchandise no secret. To the faith of these and confirmed with this signature we sent back this testimony written in our hand.



TIMOTHY TEAM

Timothy Team released their Annual Report of the spring of 2017 highlighting their accomplishments in the year. The formation faculty includes, Mr. Ochoa, Mrs. Ochoa, Sr. Dominica and Mrs. Heyl. The Timothy (TIM) Team is comprised of juniors and seniors who support the various aspects of the work



of Formation and Ministry. The students have a leadership responsibility in specific ways. First, they assist as student peer ministers to create and lead opportunities for the student community to encounter Christ. Second, they explore the theological nature of ecclesial ministry (lay, religious, and ordained) as part of the overall evangelical mission of the Church. They are the vital center of the faith life of our school community—dedicated to work and pray to encourage the students, faculty, and staff closer to Christ.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

In October, the Savio Computer Science Team won First Place in the First Bytes Computer Science Tournament. There was a total of 105 competing teams. Each team had two hours to solve the six complex problems using Java. Emily Shoemaker and Jonathan Shoemaker represented Savio and placed in the advanced division. Only Savio and perennial power Richardson High School managed to solve all six problems, and our team managed to finish in eight minutes, winning the title. In March, Savio competed in the 20th Codewars Competition in the Hewlett Packard Computer Science Tournament in




Austin. Teams of three compete in a three-hour programming competition in which over 20 problems of various difficulty need to be coded and submitted to be checked against the judges inputs. The Savio Novice team Giakhanh Hoang, Joel Uong, and Patrick Miles finished fifth. The Savio Advanced team of Emily Shoemaker and Jonathan Shoemaker won first.

ROBOTICS

Our Robotics teams had a successful year. On October 21, 2016, 14 members of the Savio Iron Eagles robotics teams attended the TAPPS inaugural robotics expo. The Robotics students met with other prospective and existing FTC teams, attended various robotics workshops, demoed their robots, and competed in a friendly scrimmage. A PATH INTO MEDICINE CHIZI IBEZIM

Chizitam (Chizi) Ibezim, graduated from St. Dominic Savio in 2014. He always knew he wanted to become a physician. He is passionate about resolving challenges and finding answers to complicated questions, and this inspired him to pursue medical school. "It is something I knew I would be good at that would challenge me every single day. I thrive from these challenges—I've come to never back away from them," he said.

The program at the University of the Missouri – Kansas City was an opportunity for Chizi to receive early clinical exposure and time for extracurricular research. He wanted to obtain his medical degree in six years

through completion more dependent on my craftsmanship, skill, and knowledge. On top of all of this, I'm an Anatomy buff who also enjoys physiological applications, and I like to get creative."

Eventually, he hopes to become a pediatric orthopedic surgeon specializing in back, foot, and ankle surgeries. It is still too early for Chizi to commit to a specific field or subspecialty, but looking ahead he does like the idea of eventually working in an academic/ teaching hospital to train other residents in the later days of his career. "I have found that you can do far more as a physician or even a student physician when you put the needs of others before yourself. For one, that is what my profession is obligated to do for the patients we serve. When one is a servant leader, it also means helping all of those around you to reach their potential, especially when they reach out to you."

In high school, Chizi would spend hours after school with Savio teachers to learn challenging concepts, particularly in mathematics. "They [Savio Faculty] demonstrated servant leadership long after the hours they were required to be at school. I eventually mastered and shared these concepts with my peers later in life. In my field of study there is not simply one physician but rather, a team. This team needs to function at its best, which only happens when each member is at their best."

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
