Students begin Lent with Mass on Ash Wednesday

The Lenten season is officially underway with Mass celebrated on Ash Wednesday, February 21, for St. Dominic Savio Catholic High School and Holy Family Catholic School students, parents, faculty, and staff at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church, leaving standing-roomonly.

The celebrant, Father Kyle
Nesrsta from St. William
Catholic Church, was assisted
by Deacon Mark Fair from St.
Vincent de Paul. Following the
homily, the ashes were blessed in
front of the congregation before
they were distributed by clergy,
students, and teachers.

In a January letter to the Faithful meant to inspire our Lenten journey, Pope Francis offers Catholics words of wisdom to sustain all during the 40-day walk with Christ.

"The Lenten journey of penance and the journey of the



Synod alike have as their goal a transfiguration, both personal and ecclesial. A transformation that, in both cases, has its model in the Transfiguration of Jesus and is achieved by the grace of his paschal mystery. So that this transfiguration may become a reality in us this year, I would like to propose two "paths" to follow in order to ascend the mountain together with Jesus

and, with him, to attain the goal," wrote the Holy Father.

He continued, "We need to listen to Jesus. Lent is a time of grace to the extent that we listen to him as he speaks to us. And how does he speak to us? First, in the word of God, which the Church offers us in the liturgy. May that word not fall on deaf ears; if we cannot always attend Mass, let us study its daily biblical readings, even with the help of the internet. In addition to the Scriptures, the Lord speaks to us through our brothers and sisters, especially in the faces and the stories of those who are in need."

His Divine mercy is of utmost importance during the season of Lent, and the Church calls on us to seek that mercy during the entire Lenten season with reflection, prayer, and penance.

The Scholastic Art Competition is the oldest and most prestigious high school art competition in the nation. Our artists were awarded 11 Gold Keys, 13 Silver Keys and 13 Honorable Mentions. HAVE YOU SEEN CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS MADE OUT OF CANNED FOOD?

CANstruction, as a part of Engineering Week, is a yearly event at St. Dominic Savio combining the knowledge and skills taught in the engineering courses with the servant leader model to serve others.

CANstruction is a nationwide, international hunger relief charity that raises millions of pounds of food each year for local food banks. Its youth events allow students aged 10-18 to use art, design, math, and problem-solving skills to create fantastic, innovative CanArt® structures using unopened cans of food.

Students learn and flex considerable skills including art/ design, science, technology, engineering, mathematics, brainstorming, creativity, construction, and community service. All food from CANstruction projects will be donated to St. Louis Catholic Church Food Pantry.

Due to the missed days from the winter ice storm, all other Engineering Week activities were canceled.



Two Savio robotics teams qualify for State finals

The First Tech Challenge (FTC) Central Texas Regional Competition was held in San Antonio on February 25 and 26 and was a huge success for both Iron Eagles teams who are now headed to the state competition in March.

The FTC State Championship will be held at the Bell County Expo Center on March 25th and 26th.

At regionals in February, Iron Eagles Optimus (3708) received an unprecedented third THINK Award and was a member of the Winning Alliance. Iron Eagles Prime (6272) received the CONTROL Award and was captain of the fourth seed alliance.

This year, the teams also competed in the Austin Xtreme League hosted by KIPP Collegiate. The League Championship was held on January 28th. At that event the teams were awarded several trophies: Optimus (3708) received the THINK Award and Winning Alliance Member, and Prime (6272) received the INNOVATE Award and Winning Alliance Member.

From the League Championship, Prime (6272) advanced directly to the Regional Championship and will now go on to the state competition.

Optimus (3708) earned a spot in the Semi-

Regional event and was able to rank high enough to advance to the Regional Championship. The team also brought home a couple of more trophies: A second THINK Award, a second Winning Alliance Member Award, and Third Place Inspire Award - given to the best all-around team.

St. Dominic Savio Catholic High School had a need to create two robotics teams because of the number of students interested in participating. The first Iron Eagles team is Optimus (FTC 3708). The second team carries the name Prime (FTC 6272). Both teams have had an amazing season.

Each year FIRST Tech Challenge announces the new "game" on the first Saturday after Labor Day. Since then, the teams have been busy designing, prototyping, and building their robots.

None of this would be possible without the assistance of our amazing industry mentors. Michael Butler, Iron Eagles Founder, retired from National Instruments where he worked as a Chief Mechanical Engineer. Michael Gregorio, the original team mentor, is a Solutions Manager, at Global IT with Flex Manufacturing. Scott Barnes, a programming mentor, is a Software Developer 4 at Oracle.

Students march for life in Washington, D.C.

While taking more than four dozen students and nearly 20 adult chaperones to the March for Life in Washington, D.C. from January 17-22, St. Dominic Savio Catholic High School represented the Diocese of Austin beautifully on a pilgrimage of a lifetime.

Students embarked on a unique journey this year on the way to the March for Life, with an initial stop at the Shrine of the Most Blessed Sacrament and the home of the Our Lady of the Angels Monastery (OLAM) in Hanceville, Alabama. The group spent a few hours visiting the Shrine, attending Mass at the crypt Church, walking the grounds, and learning more about the Poor Clare Sisters who live in the Monastery.

"The students were surprised at just how much they were struck by the Shrine," said Sr. Peter Grace, English Instructor with St. Dominic Savio. "The peace and prayerfulness of the Shrine seemed to penetrate the student's hearts because many said we should do another pilgrimage just to the Shrine."

The group arrived for the March for Life Vigil Mass on January 19, at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. where 9,000 seats were filled with students from across the United States. Mass Celebrant Bishop Michael Burbidge of Arlington, Virginia, told the families, college students, and young people gathered from across the country that "a new, important phase of work in the pro-life movement begins now." He urged those gathered in prayer and to march to communicate the love of God in their public witness for the unborn.

"I came to realize how important the people you surround yourself with are in your own faith formation," said senior Thomas Belomestnov, "An unmistakable compassion and warmth radiated from the hearts of every person we met, and I cherish the experience of having been able to suffer gladly with others and pray for the plight of those suffering."

March for Life co-organizer Mrs. Evie Cascarano says she sees the larger picture over the life of the student. "What I have seen in our Savio students over the years during this special pilgrimage is how much this has affected them and touched their hearts and souls," said Cascarano.

The group also toured the Capitol, strolled by the White House, and stopped at the Smithsonian Museum.

"God works on our hearts with each pilgrimage bringing a life-changing experience, community, and friendship – every time!" said Sr. Peter Grace.

"The biggest thing I learned on our trip to the March for Life was that both around the country and even just in my own school, I'm not alone in my beliefs, even if it feels like it at times. It really was a God moment seeing all my schoolmates coming together to fight for something we believe in and realize how powerful our voices and prayers really are. I tend to have a more cynical view on important topics like this, but the entire trip really opened my eyes to love."


